The institutional and also the moral foundations of the international order are under severe strain. Peace is broken or threatened across the world, humanitarian catastrophes are mounting. Heightened tensions between the US and China make it harder to tackle global public goods issues, and there is no global consensus on the response to Russian aggression against Ukraine. 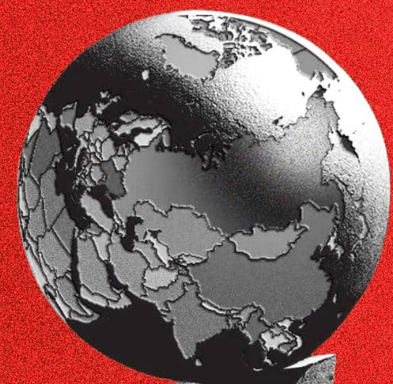

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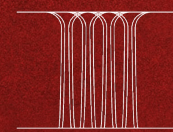
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
